Extrajudicial Measures

The Process

- Youth commits an offence
- Youth are referred by police (pre-charge)
- Youth must accept responsibility for their actions
- Extrajudicial Measures must be completed within 3 months
- Youth worker works with youth/family and/or victim to repair harm done
- Police informed of outcome of program

Non-completion

- Referred back to Police Services

Possible Measures

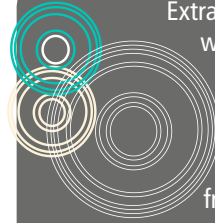
- Apology to victim (mediated or written)
- Community service
- Essay
- Mediation (school, peer, family)
- Charitable donation
- Repair damage
- Referral to Cognitive Skill-based Program
- Restitution
- Personal service
- Referral to other agency
- Referral to Youth Justice Committee Program

Program Completion

The youth must complete all measures assigned to them in order to successfully complete the program.



Extrajudicial Sanctions



Extrajudicial Sanctions provide Youth with an alternative to the court process while still holding the Young Person accountable for their actions. A Young Person is admitted into the program only after referral from the crown and the acceptance of responsibility for their actions.

Extrajudicial Sanctions include (but are not limited to):

- Contribution to a charitable organization
- Essay
- Mediation (school, peer, family)
- Personal service
- Poster
- Referral to cognitive skill-based program
- Restitution
- Apology to victim (mediated or written)
- Community service
- Referral to other community agency, where appropriate
- Referral to Youth Justice Committee Program

Community Support Program

The Community Support Program provides assistance to youth who are currently serving a term of Probation. Young persons work in conjunction with a youth worker and their Case Manager to develop an individualized plan to determine and achieve personal goals and needs.

- The program includes (but is not limited to):
- Provide each client with a youth worker who is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week
- Assist in the search for appropriate housing
- Assist in obtaining proper identification
- Assist youth in return to school system
- Provide links to employment services
- Assist client in building life skills
- Provide cognitive skill-based programs
- Provide individual, group, and/or family counselling
- Provide transportation to and from school/appointments
- Referral to other community agencies as required

Advantages

- Additional support for youth at risk on probation
- Individual case management plans
- Focus on strengths of youth and their families
- Advocate on behalf of youth
- Individual group or family counselling
- Links to education and employment opportunities
